IN THE INTERIM

I hope you were able to be a part of the Vision Retreat, and I know that some could not be there. Still, I hope you were praying for our time of working together. 8:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. is a long time, but those who participated were engaged throughout the process. Working in small table groups, we looked at results from the Bible studies and added other insights.

For me the joy came with the creativity of the groups. One group shared a dramatic presentation. Another gave us a vision image to hold of Jesus embracing the world. Others drew, sketched, wrote words and even a bit of verse. Oh, the groups shared theme songs. That work will guide the Transition Team in producing a draft of a Guiding Vision.

I thought it would be helpful to share what a Guiding Vision is and is not. These are from a publication of the Center for Parish Development, and our consultant, Dale Ziemer, is a

co-director of that center.

A Guiding Vision IS –

A congregation's expression of who it is called by God to be as a people of salt and light living for the sake of the world God loves.

A Guiding Vision –

depicts what the good news of God's saving grace and transforming love would look like if it became visible in the life and practices of the congregation. A Guiding Vision –

portrays the communal life of faith in Jesus Christ and how that new life is to be expressed concretely in and through this community of believers.

The challenge of expressing a Guiding Vision involves –

- relating the theological understandings of the church to actual practices of each unique congregation
- avoiding the expression of an unrealistic ideal
- avoiding a description only of the current situation
- envisioning the dynamic potential of your congregation

What a Guiding Vision IS NOT

A vision is not a magical elixir that cures all organizational ills. No matter how well a vision is formulated, it can be inappropriate, poorly communicated, or poorly implemented. To gain a realistic view of what a vision can and cannot accomplish, it is helpful to consider what a vision is not.

- A vision is not a prophecy or a prediction of the future. It is a compelling picture of a desired future that feasibly could be realized, with commitment and dedication.
- A vision is not a mission statement. A mission statement describes the specific role a local church will take, given its current circumstances, to move it toward

embodying its vision. A vision depicts a future way of being. Thus it provides a

- lure that draws the church into the future, toward the reality it depicts.
- A vision is not factual. It does not yet fully exist and may never be realized as originally imagined. It deals not with present experience but with possible and desirable futures.
- A vision is not static, enunciated once for all time. Vision formulation should be seen as a dynamic process, an integral part of the ongoing task of responsible participation in the ministry and mission of the church. When congregations stay with a vision too long they tend to become irrelevant and even unfaithful.
- A vision is not a constraint on actions, except for those inconsistent with the vision. A vision unleashes and then reorients the energies of the church in a common direction. It opens up opportunities rather than restricts them. It serves as a catalyst for change.

I encourage you to take a look at the words and images in the first report. That report is on the bulletin board in the breezeway. You may ask Kammy or me for a copy—either digital or in print. Working with images is a challenge for people like me who are usually rational-verballogical, but those images prod me to make new connections. I thank God for those who think in images and make connections that have to be God's gift to KCC.

The final draft will come to the congregation for discussion, changes and eventual adoption. My hope and prayer is that we will continue to catch glimpses of God's vision for KCC and that we will continue to share those glimpses and insights with one another.

MODERATOR'S NOTES

Dear Kailua Christian Church Member,

At our last Council meeting, we were ready to appoint members to the Pastoral Search Committee as prescribed by our bylaws. After much thought and discussion, your Council decided that we wanted to be as open and inclusive as possible, so we are taking another approach. We have included a section of the Search and Call Process in the United Church of Christ with the intention that we would want each member to self-qualify, using the criteria set forth in that document and to accept all who believe they meet these criteria.

Please pay special attention to the "**Personal qualities and attributes**" that individuals should have. Also review the "**Five Commitments for Search Committees**". Be sure that you can pledge to these as we will hold all committee members to these elements as we meet and go through the process of discerning where we should be in our call process.

There are a number of personal qualities and attributes to consider in the selection of Search Committee members; individuals should have:

- a passionate commitment to Christ's Church
- a positive attitude (no grudges!);
- a capacity to approach the task with openness rather than a pre-determined agenda;
- a sense of integrity and respect for others!
- an ability to be absolutely confidential;
- a capacity to listen, to participate in a group, and to come to consensus.

In addition, an individual under consideration for the Search Committee should be:

- an active supporter of the church as demonstrated by worship attendance, financial support, and participation;
- trusted and respected by the congregation;
- willing and able to make this responsibility very high priority.

FIVE COMMITMENTS FOR SEARCH COMMITTEES

A Faith Commitment... The task of the Search Committee is very simple and very complex. Initially the task is spiritual. Search Committee members make a faith commitment to develop as faith-centered, prayer-directed people of God willing to listen to God in the process of seeking a new pastor. Search Committee members engage in a 4-Way Covenant—a Covenant with their prospective pastor, the congregation, the Conference and Association, and the Holy Spirit.

A Time Commitment...Search Committee members make a time commitment. By the time the search process is completed (from first organizational meeting to the calling of a new pastor) the committee may have been working together for as little as 9 months or as long as 18-24 months. Initially most Search Committees meet weekly. Once committees begin considering pastoral profiles and scheduling interviews, the frequency of meetings increases. At times the Search Committee must travel to hear prospective pastors preach. All in all, it is a significant time commitment.

A Commitment to Confidentiality...Search Committee members make a commitment to confidentiality. Members must not talk about the content of their work. That is to say, the sharing of names of individuals under consideration is a serious breach of process. Even to speak in generalities about location or experience or gender can risk folk guessing who the committee is considering. The congregation must be kept informed at every step of the process. Sharing where the Search Committee is in the process is critical. However, until a final candidate is presented, all conversation about any candidates is closely guarded.

A Commitment to Openness...Search Committees make a commitment to genuine consideration of all candidates. The commitment involves understanding that the gifts, skills, and experience of candidates are primary in determining their ability to serve the congregation.

Commitment to Consensus...Finally, Α Committee Search members make а commitment to consensus. Members need to be of one mind in recommending their prospective pastor to the congregation. Any unreadiness on the part of any member of the Search Committee can and often does spell disaster down the road. Everyone must be able, with a clear and positive conscience, to support and endorse the individual presented before the congregation.

A proposed calendar noting the committee meeting dates is provided. While the day of the week may change when we review the days with the committee, the frequency will probably not change, except for a few cancellations. This should give you an idea of what the time commitments will be.

June – 3 meetings, Purpose: Meet with Rev. Richard Kamanu. Finalize Vision Statement, begin constructing Church Profile. Trustees will develop call agreement and compensation package.

July – 4 meetings, Purpose: Finalizing Church Profile. List vacancy. Reading UCC Ministerial Profiles training.

August – 4 meetings, Purpose: Receive Ministerial Profiles, Seek additional information, evaluation discussions.

September – 4 meetings, Purpose: Receive Ministerial Profiles, Seek additional information, evaluation discussions. **October** – 4 meetings, Purpose: Reduce candidate list to produce interview list. Prepare for interviews.

November – 3 meetings, Purpose: Conduct interviews.

December – 2 meetings, Purpose: Worshiping with the Candidates.

January – 4 meetings, Second interviews. Discernment. Offering the Call.

March – 4 meetings, Purpose: Negotiate and accept call.

I will chair the Search Committee and facilitate all of the meetings. Our priorities in this process will be the congregation, unified and informed. We will seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit, and we will reflect on the teaching and ministry of Jesus at all times. We solicit your prayers that God may use us and this process as we move into God's future.

We also held our "Visioning Retreat" on May 14th. 26 members attended and participated by sharing in small groups and presenting to all in attendance at the end of each exercise. We developed many views and thoughts and these will be condensed and the findings shared with the Congregation.

I look forward to continuing this process with you. Peace.

DEACONS MESSAGE

Pastor Jack, the Council and the Transition Committee conducted the KCC Vision



Meeting with the congregation this past month and we are still in the process of forming a new vision for the future of KCC. We had a pretty good turnout for the meeting and a lot of good input from those who attended. We studied the Sermon on the Mount (portions of Matthew 5 and 6) as the basis for our church vision. There was a pretty good consensus that the Sermon on the Mount is a very good place to start to form a compelling vision for KCC and Pastor Jack has been focusing on this scripture to help us form a Biblically based vision.

We learned at the KCC Vision Meeting that the survey that was used by the Trustees, Council and Deacons to assess the status of KCC, three areas of weakness emerged as areas where KCC should prioritize its efforts. The areas that appear to need the most work are summarized as follows:

1. We are not experiencing the Body of Christ Together. In other words: our ideas of faith are not shared freely with each other, people do not feel listened to, valued or encouraged when they bring up a new idea and when differences occur between people they are not expressed caringly.

2. We need leadership development. In other words: we are not utilizing our spiritual gifts well, our leaders are not responsive to new ideas or opportunities for the church, our leaders are not on a path of growth in providing spiritual leadership, there is no good rotation of leadership, our leaders are getting burned out and our leadership team does not experience a healthy sense of unity and mutual encouragement.

3. We need to reevaluate our ministries and structural processes. In other words: we haven't reviewed our ministries regularly and there currently isn't a good fit between the size of our structure and the ministry it supports.

One thought about a new vision for KCC is to reconsider adopting or reinstating portions of

the KCC Statement of Purpose. That statement was our focus and goal for many years and seemed to me to be very good. It was printed in the bulletin every Sunday as follows:

To be a W.A.R.M.M. church by reaching out to people, inviting them into relationship with

Jesus Christ and into the membership of the church family, nurturing all persons through active discipleship, and equipping ourselves for ministry in the church and in the world, in order to worship and glorify God.

This statement was helpful in the past in focusing our efforts on what we believed God's vision was for KCC and something similar to this may be useful again in the future.




For those who were able to attend, this was a good time of sharing, laughing, envisioning, caring and
