# In the Interim

Here we are in the middle of Consecrating Stewards. Both Debbie Fong and Nancy Arakaki have shared as Witnessing Stewards, and we look forward to hearing from Dan Jessee November 6. I hope you were able to attend the Stewardship Dinner with Rev. Wayne Ibara. My hunch is that his emphasis on "Stewardship of the Word" was both insightful and challenging. I look forward to hearing from him in Worship November 13 as our Guest Steward. Stewardship is more than what we do with our financial gifts or even our time and talents. Stewardship is living faithfully in God's rule.

One of the differences I find about being an interim pastor is dealing with "vacation." I learned long ago that taking vacations was about personal stewardship of my whole being-rest for my body, spiritual renewal and focusing on family relationships. As a "settled" pastor, I frequently stored up my vacation so that I could take as much as one month vacation. However, interim contracts can be ended with thirty-days-notice because congregations call pastors or the interim responds to a different call. As a result, I have been trying to take one week vacation every three months although I did store up the two weeks for a trip to Europe. It is also a good financial decision for the church because filling the pulpit for one Sunday is less costly than paying the interim an amount equal to one week at the conclusion of the interim's service.

That's a long introduction to the announcement

that I will be on vacation at home on Maui November 17–26 (including Thanksgiving and a regular day off). Pastor Jayne Ryan Kuroiwa has graciously agreed to be on call to handle any pastoral emergencies. In addition, the Deacons have made arrangements with Scott Furukawa to be our guest preacher. Scott is a "Honolulu Boy" who is a member of Central Union Church. In May 2016, Scott graduated from Vancouver School of Theology. He is a "Member In Discernment" with the O ahu Association UCC.

A "Member In Discernment" is a person who senses God calling them into "authorized ministry." The home churches of Members In Discernment examine them and request the Association to receive them. Discernment is a process of working with a home church, Association and a mentor to "figure out" the specific nature of the call—a call to chaplaincy, Christian Education, Music Minister, etc.—and the kind of learning that will help the person reach competency. The Members In Discernment ultimately work with a committee to prepare for an ecclesiastical council in which they are examined and hopefully authorized for ordination, commissioning or recognition.

Scott will go through that process that leads to ordination. In the United Church of Christ, candidates for ordination must have a call to a recognized ministry (pastoral ministry, teaching, missionary service, or specialized ministry) before they can be ordained. The Deacons are looking forward to meeting and working with Scott as he leads in worship and shares the message. Plan to be in worship November 20

not only to meet Scott but also to share in Thanksgiving Sunday. I will be thinking of you and praying for you as I get to worship with my home congregation after being away for more than a year.

# (Biography provided by Scott)

I am Scott Furukawa, a "local boy," third generation (Sansei) Japanese American born in Honolulu. I grew up in the working class neighborhood of Palolo Valley, attended public schools, and graduated from the University of Hawaii. At the turn of the twentieth century, my grandparents, Issei (first generation), immigrated to Hawaii from Fukuoka, Japan to seek a "better" life. My paternal grandfather worked as a talented landscaper of Japanese gardens. He designed the garden at Lau Yee Chai, a well-known Chinese restaurant in Waikiki. My maternal grandparents owned a small neighborhood grocery store in Manoa Valley. My father was a Kibei, which is a term given Japanese Americans born in the United States who returned to America after receiving their formal education in Japan. While in his early twenties, he served as a Japanese language teacher and taught school-age children in Honolulu. This would lead to his arrest and four-year internment after Japan's attack on Pearl Harbor. After WWII, he spent the rest of his work life as a mechanic for the Honolulu Gas Co. My mother worked as seamstress at the old Alfred Shaheen garment factory. This is my family. This was the sphere in which my older brother and I would learn the standards and values that would guide us the rest of our lives.

I spent most of my working career (30 years) in the corporate world as a branch manager in Honolulu for a major Wall Street investment firm. Seeking a new direction for my life, I took the unconventional path of a second vocational career in church ministry, serving as Director of Community Outreach at Central Union Church, a 183 year-old church steeped in history with missionary roots. My main responsibility was to lead a weekly worship service for the homeless communities living at Ala Moana and Kaka'ako parks. For many of the people living in the park, this was their only contact with church.

I completed my seminary studies at Vancouver School of Theology's Indigenous Studies Program in Vancouver, British Columbia. It is the only degree program in North America engaged in ministry with indigenous communities in Canada and the United States. I graduated with honors receiving the outstanding student award in Reformation and Church History.

I am currently working towards my ordination with the O'ahu Association of the United Church of Christ.

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#### **MODERATOR'S NOTES**

We were fortunate to have Pastor Wayne Ibara, senior pastor at Makiki Christian Church, speak to us at our recent Stewardship kick off dinner. He gave us many things to think about but a quote that said "If you want to know what the health of a church is, find out what kind of conversations are going on in the congregation" left me thinking. During the last year we have been hard at work trying to understand who we are as a church and where God wants us to be. Financial positions and human resources are the most obvious markers of the health of the church and your Trustees and Council have had many conversations regarding those two resources. The conversation element was a new marker to me and I've spent some time thinking about it. Upon reflection over the past 15 years, I've observed that conversations have taken place but they were not universally shared. The result seems to be that concerns about our theology, pastor, members, etc. did not have a chance to be shared. I believe that the result was that the congregation did not have a chance to grow. Instead, splits occurred and people left. It is ironic that the polity of the UCC denomination allows so much flexibility and range in its churches that however KCC evolved in all aspects of its life, it would have found support and resources within the denomination.

In gathering the data on our church in this interim period, I've found that we are 47% of Japanese ancestry. Being part of that culture myself. I know that it is very conservative when it comes to communication. Be respectful, don't make waves, be humble, you know what I mean. So I can see as a congregation, why we may have not had broad conversations expressing our concerns, fears, and hopes. The counter to this cultural tendency is our Christian faith and how we live it in our community at KCC. I believe that our faith leads us with love; compassion, forgiveness, and understanding which should help us overcome whatever cultural biases and conflicts that might lead us to fracturing as a group.

My last observation regarding conversations is that of theological ("the study of religious faith, practice, and experience: the study of God and God's relation to the world") conflict. Churches have clergy and in the case of the UCC denomination, these individuals are vetted and most have educations of at least a masters level or higher in some area of ministry. I could never understand why any member of our church, faced with a theological question or conflict would not seek out the advice and council of our pastor. I can speak from experience that our current interim and our past pastor would never try to convert a congregant to one way of belief or another. Their main goal was and is to support that individual where ever that person was in their faith journey. I do not believe that any of us has "arrived" but are on a continuous journey in understanding Jesus and through him gaining broader insights to our relationship with God.

BECOMING A Dear members and friends,

I would guess that you are familiar with the "Three T's" of Steward-

ship: Time, Talent and Treasure. Makiki Christian Church used to base its annual campaign on this understanding of stewardship. But through the years, our understanding of Christian stewardship grew and expanded. We began making a shift in our perspective.

For example, time, talent and treasure all focus on the individual. They ask each one to consider what his or her talent might be, how much time they might give and how much money. So from this stewardship perspective, *our* stewardship is essentially *my* stewardship. First change of perspective: *Stewardship is congregational*. *Not just about my choices, but ours together*.

So what are we, the Body of Christ, stewards over? Second shift in perspective: We are stewards of God's good gifts to us, not just what we own personally. This makes stewardship a congregational and spiritual issue—not just a personal and practical question. The list of God's gifts might begin with the Good News of Jesus Christ, as well as the gifts and the fruit of the Spirit. And what about your tangible resources, like your buildings and property? What about your human resources? What about your children? What sorts of stewarding responses do these gifts call for?

Stewardship is such a rich subject that seen properly, it encompasses our whole life and our life together, our whole response to live a life of faith. The stewardship of Time can be seen not just as a commitment to give so many hours a week or month to the church. It can also be seen as a commitment to discern when we stand at a critical moment, a key opportunity—what the writers of the New Testament called *kairos*: God's time. The Church—*your* church as well as my church—are at such a crossroads. It is a challenging time for all of us, but it is also an exciting and creative time.

At such a time as this, I am honored and privileged to serve as your Guest Steward. I look forward to seeing you on Nov. 13.

# TRUSTEE'S TIDBITS

Under the diligent stewardship of Trustee Gary Nham and Pastor Jack, KCC has been treated to a Consecrating Steward experience. On Tuesday, October 18, a group of over 30 members and friends of KCC met, over dinner with Guest Consecrating Steward, Reverend Wayne Ibara of Makiki Christian Church. The group also shared the dinner prepared for our River of Life guests. Pastor Ibara read a fable from "Translating the Word," from The Orthodox Heretic: and Other Impossible Tales, by Peter Rollins. He asked the group to consider this thought, "Therefore it is impossible to affirm God's Word apart from becoming that Word, apart from being the place where that Word becomes a living, breathing act. This divine Word cannot then be rendered into an object that is somehow separate from the subject who hears it or reads it, for the Word of God is an incarnated Word that is lived. Its call is heard only by those who inhale the aroma of the words and who exhale life, liberation and love." Debbie Fong, Nancy Arakaki and Dan Jessee was also willing to share their personal commitment to the living Word. Pastor Wayne will return on Sunday, November 13, a Sunday we have declared to be "Consecration Sunday".

Contained with this newsletter is a letter from Pastor Wayne. It will encourage you to consider what God has done for you and how we each live the Word. The Hawaii Conference United Church of Christ is conducting an assessment study this fall and winter in order to better understand the viewpoints of pastors and lay leaders across the Conference related to a number of initiatives and issues.
