"The best thing about Kailua Christian Church" was asked during a Children's Story one Sunday. I also turned to the congregation to ask several youth besides the one child who had come forward to hear a message. What I heard was what I had already known: the people, the food and fellowship after worship, the care the church reaches out to the community, the prayers we offer to God, and perhaps the most memorable response, "God's everlasting love!" In my interactions with members and friends, at board and committee meetings, and just my intuitive sense, is that Kailua Christian Church is a place where there is love as Jesus spoke of in John's Gospel.

I can say it was wonderful to be a pulpit supply pastor at KCC for several Sundays before being called to be your intentional interim pastor. On Sunday, November 4, I preached on "Hesed: God's Loving Kindness" from the book of Ruth. I, too, have felt and experienced what you who are part of the body of Christ share with each other. This gift which began when the church was first organized, continues today and is to be treasured! You who are leaders have taken the torch. Those who carry on the ministry of Christ will one day hear the words, "Well done, good and faithful servant!"

The challenge that this church faces is the diversity of theological beliefs that exist. Discussion arise about how to interpret the Bible, what the church's vision should be, and how the congregation should go about its mission (to name a few). Interim ministry identifies the critical issues and moves in the direction of resolution. The church will know when it has come together as one (the UCC motto from Jesus is "that they may all be one") when a new, called pastor arrives!

Meanwhile, we continue to worship and fellowship on Sundays as committees, boards and the council meet to carry out the business of the church. The trustees realize the importance of stewardship in fulfilling their responsibilities. The deacons are restructuring the undershepherd groups. The council is reviewing the way the church has done things in an attempt to find better ways to accomplish God's will for KCC. And all of us are finding ways where we can be involved in the life of our church.

Thank you for calling me as your pastor. I enjoy being a part-time intentional interim because I prioritize my time each week and select the most important tasks to accomplish. Yes, our Sunday worship is so often very special and so are the members, friends and visitors! To all of this, let us "Praise the Lord!"

One lady has made me feel especially welcome from day one, sitting next to me and being very friendly and easy to talk to. You know, it only takes one to make someone feel welcome.

I am saddened to have to leave this church. I am only one person, but I'm sure I've made a difference to them just to feel my presence. Just like back home when there's a new face, it is uplifting to the whole church. They are a small church just like us.

It was sad to break the news to them that I would not be returning any more. Brenton and his family are preparing to move to California.

I clearly felt God's hand guiding my plans here. Being that my plane tickets were bought 5 months ago, I had no idea exactly when to arrive and leave, but just kind of guessed. As it turned out, the timing was just right. We arrived a few days before Lara and family were to arrive and left after they all left and also left after we were able to help Ortencia and Aileen at the airport checking in with all their excess baggage for their big move to California. (Brenton is staying back for 2 weeks to clean up the apartment and wait for the movers). I could not have planned it better without the help of the Holy Spirit guiding my plans, though I didn't realize it back then. I just put all my faith in God and he allows my life to fall into place, time and time again. Although, I am not faithful in doing daily devotions, I am faithful in going to church and serving my church. I feel guilty that I only do mini prayers throughout the week, but I think God appreciates what I do for him and sees through my heart. I am so grateful and happy that God shows his love for me by making my life "easy".

NOTE FROM FAMILY PROMISE MINISTRY

Mahalo for making 2018 our best year yet!

Your donations and support made 2018 a landmark year of growth for Family Promise of Hawaii! Thanks to you, more than 380 parents and children experiencing homelessness were provided with a safe place to sleep at night, meals, support services, and help securing long-term housing.

Here are just a few things your donations made possible in 2018:

• 61 families were able to escape homelessness and move into permanent housing of their very own.

After securing housing with the help of Family Promise, 98% of families enrolled in the After Care program maintained their own permanent housing long-term!

- Through the Emergency Shelter program, 172 people (including 85 children) were provided with overnight shelter, meals and other daily necessities.
- The new Diversion program, launched in 2018, provided housing support and case management for more than 200 people who were on the brink of becoming homeless. With that help, 31 families were able to secure permanent housing, keeping them from needing emergency shelter.

We're so proud that our community helped provide housing for so many families in need last year. Let's keep it up in 2019! *Mahalo nui loa!*

It was a wonderful reunion with Chef Dan (Kapi'olani Community College instructor) who conducted a Healthy Cooking session in our kitchen, 15 years ago.

Chef Dan will be developing a culinary program at Windward Community College. We can look forward to excellent community outreach, noncredit cooking classes!

Our next bi-monthly meeting will be on March 30, the 5th Sat. We invite all who are interested in learning how to use the Automated External Defibrillator (AED), a gift from John Sakamoto, which will be installed at our church.

Charles Buck named president and CEO of United Church Funds


