"Finding Meaning and Purpose in Life" by Pastor Chris Eng

"What gave your life meaning and purpose," I would ask

when visiting a terminally ill patient. As a chaplain with Hospice Hawaii for 2 years, the response gave me a sense of who this person was and still is, to some extent. In our youth, we search for our identity. As a young adult, we might focus on finding our life's path in terms of a calling or career. At the same time, we enter into meaningful relationships and sometimes one of these turns serious. Sometimes getting married provides much joy. And for some, having a child can be one of life's blessings. Along the way, some sport, hobby, recreation or pastime becomes our passion. There are so many responses to what gives each of us meaning and purpose in life. When an individual looks back over their life, no matter how long or short, there is usually something that stands out.

Churches go through periods when its members must define the meaning and purpose of "the Body of Christ" that meets in a particular place and worships at various times. When a pastor leaves the church for whatever reason, it is a time to ask, "what gives meaning and purpose to our church?" Looking back, the members of Kailua Christian Church UCC can answer this in many ways including individuals answering Jesus' call to follow him and being baptized and wanting to become part of the life of this congregation because of the tremendous faith in

God that people have. Many find KCC to be a loving church. What happens when the members seem to have lost this sense of being the church and there has been an experience of the opposite of what the church has been and should be?

So often, when we have lost our way, we have done or said something that has hurt another person. The converse is also true when someone has said or done something that has really caused us much pain. Intellectually, we know that we must embrace forgiveness. Either we forgive someone who has hurt us or we accept forgiveness from someone we have caused much pain. This can be one of life's most difficult things to do. I have spoken of the importance of forgiveness in the sermons and prayers that I have given since last November when I began as the interim pastor. I will continue to invite those who seem "stuck" and unable to move on to speak to me. Together we will find a way where there does not seem to be one.

Addressing our church in the interim is also an opportunity to think about the church's purpose from a biblical standpoint. My esteemed colleague in ministry, the Rev. Anthony B. Robinson shares the following 9 passages with churches in pastoral search. We hired him as a church consultant when I announced that I was retiring in 2 years and "Tony" spent a weekend at Waiokeola Congregational Church UCC. He was the keynote speaker at an Aha Pae'aina of our Hawaii Conference United Church of Christ sharing his book, Transform-

ing Congregational Culture that was published in 2003.

After we celebrate Pentecost Sunday on June 9, 2019 by wearing red during the worship, I will focus on the following Passages of Scripture on the Purpose of the Church:

- June 16: Genesis 12: 1 4: "Blessed to be a blessing"
- June 23: Leviticus 19: 1-2: "You shall be holy, for the Lord your God is holy"
- June 30: Matthew 5: 13 16: "Salt of the earth, light to the world"
- July 7: Matthew 28: 16 ff: "Go ye into all the world and make disciples"
- July 14: John 20: 19 23: "As the Father sent me, so I send you"
- July 21: Acts 1: 7 8: You shall be my witnesses"
- July 28: Romans 4: 13 25: The God who gives life to the dead"
- August 4: Romans 12: 1-2: "Be not conformed but transformed"
- August 11: 1 Corinthians 1: 26 ff: "Not many of you were wise by human standards"

Have faith my friends! We are moving in the right direction as we have approved a Common Vision and are now in the process of selecting the members of the Pastoral Search Committee.

Thank you to all the members who attended the congregational meeting and enabled us to vote and pass these two critical items that were another step in moving forward with our goal of finding a settled pastor.

At our latest Council meeting, we determined that June 23, 2019 would be the cut-off date to accept names for consideration to serve on the pastoral search committee. If you are interested in participating in this committee, please let the office know. You may also reach out to any of the church leaders. Please note that we will be limiting the number of individuals on the committee to the required total of 8 members per our KCC Bylaws.

Thank you to all members and friends who regularly attend our Sunday worship service at KCC. For those that have not been to KCC in a while, please consider returning to KCC to once again worship our Lord, Jesus. We welcome all of you to participate in our Sunday

worship service and be part of this exciting time in the life of our beloved KCC

DEACONS MESSAGE

Going to the Kailua Library is a joy for me as I browse through the variety of books.



For less than five dollars, I can purchase several books. After reading and enjoying them, I later return some of them for recycling and reuse.

Recently, I found this book called, 365 Days of Praise, a daily guide written by Deacon Steve Greco who is an ordained Deacon in the Roman Catholic Diocese. In one of his daily guide, I came across this verse in Psalm 94:18-19: "When I say, my foot is slipping, your love, LORD, holds me up; when cares increase within me, your comfort give me joy." I have never read this scripture verse before and thought of more people slipping or falling.

His devotional message says: "Have you ever walked a tightrope? If you have, then you may have experienced physical fear. Fear "really" takes over if your food slips. At this point, something takes over that sustains you. You reach deep within your self to achieve peace and keep your balance. With the Lord you never need to worry about slipping. When it occurs, and when you trust in Jesus, He takes over your walk. Yes, then the peace of the Lord takes over."

It is comforting to know that the Lord God is always with us when we go through trials, having experienced the results from my falls. We can trust in the Lord for He cares for us, (1 Peter 5:7) and through prayer and supplication with thanksgiving make our requests known to God and His peace will be with us which passes or understanding. (Philippians 4:6-7).

The following is a well-known story which shows God's loving care for us called:

FOOTPRINTS

The contract for Reverend Eng was extended and a new contract with increased hours of service was drafted and approved by the con-Many blessings to Scott who regregation. placed the broken antenna and Barney who donated headphones. Their generous and gracious gifts repaired the long broken Assisted Listening System (ALS) and restored listening to worship services for those needing hearing assistance. Gary Yamamoto again donated more time, expertise and resources to mitigate risks with further deterioration to our concrete stairs and walkways. Aaron generously donated his time and talents to trouble shoot and correct intermittent operations with our overhead projection system. We are a small congregation with many needs. We rely on hearts and hands to steward and restore pride as we and our facilities age. Some are wondering what needs to be done. The following is a list of a few things we need to sustain, maintain or repair. Please help if you are able.

- 1. Parking Lot. Remove weeds and debris clogging parking lot dry wells.
- 2. Vegetation. Remove thorny bush on left side facing sanctuary to prevent roots from damaging concrete.
- 3. Vegetation. Remove thorny bushes fronting offices and library to prevent roots from damaging concrete.
- 4. Men's Lavatory. Replace damaged urinal sign.
- 5. Refreshment room. Repair damaged concrete sill and repaint.
- 6. Hinges on security doors to second floor Repair deteriorated hinges and repaint.
- 7. Carport hurricane ties. Remove rust and repaint.
- 8. Rock garden fronting sanctuary. Remove weeds and debris.
- 9. Door locks and hinges. Lubricate with graphite.
- 10. Water hoses. Replace deteriorated hoses.
- 11. Washer/dryer. Obtain/install protective covers.
- 12. Outside of kitchen. Discard unused/seldom used items and organize.
- 13. Utility closet. Discard unused/seldom used items and organize.
- 13. Storage closet near stairs. Discard unused/seldom used items and organize.
- 14. Storage closet upstairs. Discard unused/seldom used items and organize.
- 15. Doors to sanctuary. Touchup paint bare areas sanded to correct binding.
- 16. Library. Clean and organize.

Report from Spring Mokupuni 2019

The Oahu Association Spring Mokupuni was held at Makiki Christian Church. Breakfast consisted of Activa yogurt, mixed fruit bowl with lots of various berries and fresh crispy pastries from a bakery, not Costco. Breaktime brought out furikake Chex mix. Lunch was mayonnaise furikake encrusted salmon with salad and rice and mandarin orange tapioca pearl pudding.

Rev. Wayne Ibara, senior pastor of Makiki Christian Church opened with remarks about the future of doing church. Our salvation is for the life of the whole world, not just for ourselves. We need to rethink and evaluate the way we worship God. In the boom days of church, we did not have to do anything. People just came. Now, we're all thinking of ways to bring more people in. The purpose of doing Mokupuni is to gather, share, work and pray together.

Danny Tengan retired from the State of Hawaii as the head of Disaster Preparedness 5 years ago. He now volunteers his time for the UCC at the national as well as local level. He mainly addressed how and what it means for churches to be prepared to offer their buildings as shelter for the neighbors in times of disaster. One thing we can all do is put our important documents in

a ziplock bag. He is available as a speaker for anyone interested.

Another speaker was Rev. Josh Hayashi. His primary employment is with Punahou School as a chaplain. His other area of interest is the future of churches in Hawaii. He comes from a line of clergy on his father's side as well as his mother's side. His uncle is Rev. Gerald Chinen, who many of us know. He is one of 3 UCC ministers in Hawaii less than 60 years of age. He is very concerned with the future of mainline churches in Hawaii, especially the UCC. Some people have predicted that mainline churches have only 21 Easters left to celebrate. We all know the world is changing. Young people are disconnected from church as a building, but not from God. They love to do mission work.

The State of Hawaii uses annual income of \$96,000 as a qualifier for low income housing. How many of us are able to pay our ministers this amount?

Rev. Hayashi has partnered with a Christian developer and architect in order to help churches decide how to best use their property. Makiki Christian Church has been collaborating with them to explore options for their church.

The next speaker was Bernie Kim. Past moderator of Makiki Christian Church. He went into great detail the trials of the past 4 years in dealing with big decisions that need to be made regarding their church, primarily due to structural deterioration. Restoration costs are undetermined but one estimate place it at a minimum of Like every other church, their 10 million. membership is mainly older, and they no longer have the membership they once had. Previously, many members were in the construction industry or other blue-collar trades and so repairs to the castle could be done in house. No longer the case with the younger/offspring generation. As a result, repairs have lapsed. The castle is currently insured for only 5 million. They are not sure if they will be able to obtain higher insurance coverage. They are currently dealing with 4 options. Partial development to no development. At each meeting members show up

exclaiming the were not told of options and also with those wanting no development threatening to leave. Rev. Hayashi and his group have been helping to draw up several planning options.

They use Proverbs 29:18 to guide their meetings. "Where there is no revelation, people cast off restraint, but blessed is the one who heeds wisdom's instruction". Bernie also firmly believes that the first responsibility of leadership is to define reality and the leverage of resources.

The UCC Transition House will hold its annual fundraiser in November.
