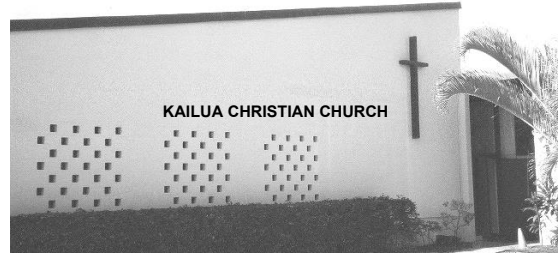

“God’s Story is Big Enough to Include All of Our Individual Stories!”

Fireworks flew into the air every time the Huskies made a touchdown. The University of Washington football team entered Husky stadium running through a cloud of purple smoke with the words, “*Purple Reign*” (a play on Prince) displayed in bright lights. I became a fan during the era of Sonny SixKiller when I took graduate courses on the UW campus that were part of my graduate studies at UH whose Rainbow Warriors had also entered the football field. Thanks to Steven and Cathy Yabusaki from Hawaii who live in Richmond, WA, the 3 of us were cheering for both UH and UW. In life, we may find ourselves wishing the best for opposing sides where there is only one winner. On 9/14/19, the final score was UW 52, UH 20.

The next day, I attended the Sunday worship at the Seattle Japanese Baptist Church (American Baptist Churches, USA) where I was ordained into the Christian ministry 40 years ago. The Yabusaki’s and I attended the 120th Anniversary luncheon at the new Hyatt Southport on Lake Washington just hours before the football game! I was told that the church had undergone many changes. It was now a church where members were diverse, not just Japanese as it was back in the 70’s. Jane Kitasako Cho who was in one of my discipleship groups and was responsible for me wanting to attend wrote this: “*the church is definitely transitioning while still attempting to honor our heritage and ethnicity of the founders.*” Pastor Samuel Kim, a Canadian, has been at JBC only a year, bringing a fresh approach to ministry

as contrasted with the past. Perhaps there is a similar challenge as KCC moves into the future while still honoring its past.

Most anniversary banquets have keynote speakers but there were 4 members this Saturday morning, who were Japanese and represented a spectrum in ages who shared their testimonies. During Sunday worship the next day, instead of a sermon, 4 members who were non-Japanese, also shared their testimonies. Back here, 3 members shared their testimonies during the September 15 worship hour at KCC. What I heard during the end of worship in Seattle was this: “*God’s story is big enough to include all of our individual and personal stories.*” Yes! We have different experiences and come to be part of a church as the Holy Spirit guides us but somehow the Gospel story is large enough to welcome and include all of our stories! Very often, we become inspired when someone shares their testimony. I do!

Attending the UW versus UH football game as well as hearing 8 individual’s testimonies about how God has worked in their lives and brought them to church was uplifting. There will always be differences that exist between people wherever people gather. What we want to do is to affirm God’s story about Jesus the Christ as we extend an extravagant welcome. Let us take time to listen to each other’s stories. As we move beyond our differences, we will discover God’s love bringing us together as Christ’s church! Thank you, Kailua Christian Church UCC for allowing me to travel to Seattle which resulted in these helpful insights about ministry.

DEACONS MESSAGE**God Is In All Days**

I recently finished reading the book by author Max Lucado titled, Trade Your Cares for Calm. He writes about, God Is In All Days. He shares the story about Frideric Handel's wife who discovered a page of her husband's famous oratorio Messiah. The entire work was more than two hundred pages long. The page that she found on the kitchen table had only one minor key that her husband had written on a piece of paper. This made no sense. She marched into his studio and said, "This does not make sense. You are a lousy composer." What did he think? Perhaps something similar to what God thinks when we do the same, we point to the minor key and say, "This makes no sense!" Yet of all God's creations, how much have we seen? Only a tiny peep through a door's peephole. Is it possible that there is some explanation for suffering that we know nothing about? What if God's answer to the question of suffering requires more megabytes than our tiny minds have not been given? And is it possible that the wonder of heaven will make the most difficult life a good bargain? As Paul says in 2 Corinthians 4:17, "Our light and momentary trouble are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all." What is coming will make sense of what is happening now. Let God finish his work. Let the composer complete his symphony. The forecast is simple. Good days, bad days. But God is in All days. He is the Lord of the famine and the feast, and he uses both to accomplish his will!

Author Max Lucado also suggest in his book eight powerful worry stoppers called Worry Busters.

1. First Pray. "Let Him have all your worries and cares." (1 Peter 5:7 TLB)
2. Be Patient. "Rest in the Lord and wait patiently for Him." (Psalm 37:7 NASB)

3. Act on It. The moment a concern arises deal with it, rather than dwell on it.
4. Write a worry list. Record your anxious thoughts. Leave them for a while. Review what you wrote to see how many turned into reality.
5. Evaluate your worry list. Check recurring areas and pray specifically about them.
6. Focus on today's needs. God meets our needs daily. He will give you what you need when you need it. "Let us come boldly to the throne of our God. There we will receive his mercy and we will find grace to help us when we need it the most." (Hebrews 4:16)
7. Share Your Feelings. Be it a loved one, or a close friend. Ask them to pray for you. They are more than willing to help you. Less worry on your part and more happiness on theirs.
8. Let God be enough! Jesus concludes his "calm-ness" with the challenge, "Your Heavenly Father already knows all your needs. Seek the kingdom of God above all else, and live righteously and he will give you everything you need." (Matthew 6:32-33 NLT)

Eight steps. Pray first. Easy, now. Act on it. Compile a worry list. Evaluate your worry categories. Focus on today. Unleash a worry army. Let God be enough!

Put them together and you get
P-E-A-C-E-F-U-L!

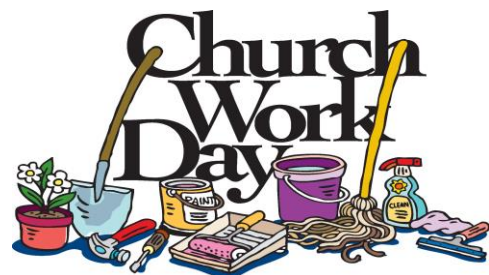
KCC TRUSTEES NEWS

Workday Reminder. The next workday is scheduled for 8:00 – 10:00 am Saturday, October 12, 2019. Focus will be on cleaning and organizing, the Sanctuary front door and security screens, storage rooms on the first floor, bathroom screens, backside of the kitchen and the transitional housing.

LCP - So Who Are We Now? The Pastoral Search Committee (PSC) includes trustees who are working with other PSC members to develop a Local Church Profile (LCP), which identifies the facts needed to responsibly identify the mission and ministry of our congregation. The LCP template requests attendance and participant information be provided. Charts showing monthly and weekly attendance profiles were developed from data trustee John Sakamoto has been faithfully collecting from our friendship pads. The data identified an average of 57 persons, 35 members (about 24% of our approximately 147 members), 15 friends, 5 children and 2 visitors attended our church from January 2018 to June 2019 on a weekly basis. Trend charts show a relatively consistent attendance profile with higher attendance during March and April. Deacon Nancy Arakaki and trustee John Sakamoto teamed together to identify data on participation, adults, household types, education levels, and employment. The following estimates were developed from their hard work. 89% of participants have been in the church for more than 5 years; 63% for more than 10 years. 89% of participants have an education level beyond high school. 66% of adults are still employed. The LCP template also requests data on finances and assets. Recent financial information was provided based on treasurer reports provided by the Treasurer Pam Morikawa and other relevant information.

Budget News. The trustees are working hard with others in the Council to develop the 2020 budget. Our congregation has been very, very gracious and generous in the past. But the cur-

rent reality is more help will be needed if we want to continue to maintain operations within our incomes. There is some good news and some bad news. First the good news. A review of the July 2019 treasurer report identified that the total gross income exceeded total gross expenses by at least \$14,800. This is due to specific offerings which form 22% of the gross income. However specific offerings are received from a few very generous donors and are targeted for specific funds only. Now the bad news. We have a cash flow imbalance. In 2019, 93% of our budgeted income comes from pledges (65%) and non-pledges (28%). But many of our pledge members are no longer able, no longer continuing to contribute or are experiencing serious health challenges curbing their capacity and capability to contribute. Without special offerings earmarked to specific funds, expenses exceeded incomes 57% of the time (four of the past seven months). Cumulative expenses currently exceed incomes by over \$9,100 with five more months remaining. Continuing negative cash flows will impact development of the 2020 budget and will likely require participation from the congregation to identify, determine, authorize the appropriate immediate and longer term compensating remedies to be taken (e.g. withdrawing from savings, eliminating or reducing expenses and services to live within our means, strategically investing in higher income streams). The trustees will be requesting concurrence from the council to hold informational gatherings after church services to inform and foster participation from the congregation to identify, determine and implement appropriate initiatives.

We have been busy meeting, reflecting on Bible studies, and drafting a very preliminary Local Church Profile. We are by no means close to a finished product – how could we? We haven’t involved You, and You, and You in hearing what you think God wants for our beloved KCC. Don’t worry, in the weeks to come, you will be invited to participate in focus groups and surveys to help us.

In our meetings, we have benefitted from scripture on how God is generous beyond our understanding (Matthew 20:1-16) and how we are each others’ brothers and sisters (Mark 3:31-35). We have also shared what makes KCC so special to

us and how we have seen the church grow and change. And some have shared dreams for the future.

At Sunday worship September 29, the Pastoral Search Committee was publicly commissioned and we the members promised to faithfully perform the vital task of searching for a new pastor and to be open to the leading of the Holy Spirit in all we do, say and decide. We promised to establish a harmonious working relationship within our committee; to maintain consistent attendance at our Search Committee meetings; to be open and patient listeners to each other and to the congregation; to listen carefully to your hopes and dreams as we consult with you, the members, in the development of a description of our church community and the style of pastoral leadership we seek; to maintain strict confidentiality in all we read, say, and hear – protecting both the privacy of each other and of potential candidates.

Having made this public covenant, we will work with each other, we will work side by side, for all will know we are Christians by our love.

A letter of thanks from Beverly, Pastor Dale and family. Pastor Dale was on staff here at KCC as the youth minister for 6 years (1976 to 1983), went to seminary, returned to be senior pastor in 1987 and served through 1993. Bev served diligently at his side throughout this time and they continued to be a great ongoing support whenever KCC has had a need. Pastor Dale has provided pastoral care for blessings and funerals when we were without a Pastor and have shared as guest pastor at the pulpit during our transition time, before our interim pastors. Please keep our friends in your prayers.

Our dear Kailua Christian Church family,

Bev, Anthony, Andrew, Alex, and I hold wonderfully deep memories of life and love with you that shapes and inspires our gratitude for God's unfailing love.

This past year you have comforted and encouraged us through the long and challenging process of Bev's mastectomy surgery and the year of intense chemo and radiation. Your thoughtful cards, emails, visits, meals and prayers gave Bev and our family more assurance and strength than I can fully express, but deeply felt.

In July, follow up scans were given to start what the Drs and we thought was the months of recovery from the chemo/radiation process. The Dr's instead found to their surprise, that Bev's cancer had spread to numerous spots on her bones. They found tumors on her pelvic bone, up her back bone, shoulder and skull. More test revealed no tumors in her lungs, liver or brain. We are grateful for that.

The Dr considers this new development incurable, with a median life span of 3-5 years, some live longer, some less. He told us this is a new strategy of a different chemo aimed at restraining rate and spread of growth. He said the other factor is to balance further treatment with quality of life. Bev began the chemo pill once a day and once a month shot to try and reinforce the bone. Bev has some pain in her bones in part from the meds. In time this will probably be a greater effect of the tumors on her bones.

We were stunned with this news, as was the Dr. This new growth developed while Bev was under strong and what was hoped to be a thorough at-

tempt to eliminate the cancer. Thus is the nature of cancer to find its way around many efforts to get at it.

Bev reflected that night on quality of life. She thanked God for the way God has loved and lead us over the years to seek Him, listen and follow as best as we could with our sense of call to ministry, living life with our family and friends as best as we could. While we are still learning to give ourselves more fully to all God is saying and doing even in these days, we have much that we are so thankful for that makes the quality of our lives so good.

So thank you for all you have poured into each of us over so many years and in so many special ways. You have always made us feel that we are never forgotten or far from your hearts and prayers.

We only hope you know we have never forgotten or ceased in giving thanks to God for you.

For now, we are still finding the words as we weigh the impact of this news. Many, upon hearing this news, have said they have, "No words". We feel the same. Just know that each expression of love and "being with us" is as precious of anything we can imagine could be said.

We believe and welcome God bringing miraculous healing. Above all we take great comfort in all our thoughts, struggles, fears, hopes and joys, that whatever comes we are in His hands now and forever. You remind us of this in your loving care. We thank God, we thank you.

For now Bev has good strength to pick up grandkids after school a couple days a week, pull weeds, get paper work things in order, close up her desk at school, and do some moderate travel with her favorite life partner(my words, Ha).

We float through feelings of sadness and the limits of our being able to really understand it all.

And we find joy along the way in small and large ways that gives us a lift.

Thank you for letting us share with you. Thank you for always being here with us and for us, as we are for you as well.
