

"Celebrating the Spirit of Charter Members Now with the Lord"

Jim Croce's classic 1972 song, **Time in a Bottle** includes the words, "*But there never seems to be enough time, To do the things you want to do, Once you find them.*" Whenever I listened to the lyrics of this song as it played over the airwaves, I thought of all the things I wished I could do but simply did not have the time to do. As May 2020 arrives, are you finding time to do things you really want to do? At the same time, there remain those things we wished we could do but can't. We have to find new ways of celebrating Mother's Day, the Class of 2020 and Memorial Day as this new month arrives.

The author of Ecclesiastes wrote, "God has made everything suitable for its time; moreover, he has put a sense of past and future into their minds." 3:11a, N.R.S.V. This speaks to our sense of time right now. We learn to let go of the past and we look forward with anticipation to what hopefully will occur in our future. They included Minoru Teruya, Satsuki Nemoto and Mildred Sakamoto who passed away from 2018 through the present. We also include Ruth Uyechi \*(10/59), Lillian Sakaguchi \*(4/60), and Ruth Masuno \*(5/61) who became members after the Charter was established but were included at the 30th anniversary in the spirit of being a charter member.  $*(membership \ date)$ 

I have felt your loss when these special individuals went home to be with the Lord. Officiating at 3 of these Charter Member Memorial Services, what their families remembered about them is inspiring. Sats Nemoto was a very strong Christian, very devoted and "Committed to the Faith." Ruth Uyechi was a "Woman of Faith" and Ruth Masuno left us a "Legacy of Faith." Isn't it amazing that "*faith*" is the common thread which touched family, friends and members of the church for each of these persons?

Hebrews 11:1 reminds us of what it means to believe: "Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." Right now there are many challenges that we face because of COVID-19. From time to time, we may experience fear, anxiety, stress, anger, sadness, depression. frustration, pain, and suffering. What might help us is the memory of Charter Members whose lives may have touched us. But there is also a way that we could receive their support right now.

Moving to the next chapter, Hebrews 12: 1- 2 states, "*Therefore, since we are surrounded by so* great a cloud of witnesses, let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith." This 'cloud of witnesses' is comprised of those who have left us and are in the presence of the Lord. They are on the sidelines (as we run) and they cheer us on and inspire us as we recall how they lived their lives!

As we see the time passing by, may God give us insight as to what we should be doing and inspiration to accomplish it! As we are inspired by those now with God, may we inspire others!

Please keep each other in prayer, for safety and continued good health!!



**Four Biblical Mothers To Remember On Mother's Day** - by Andy Rau, former senior manager for Bible Gateway.

We hope you'll take some time this weekend to pay respects to your mother—or if that isn't possible, to somebody in your life who embodies the grace and wisdom we associate with godly mothers. Here is a list of four famous moms from the Bible.

The Bible speaks highly of mothers who raise children and guide their families in a righteous manner; in the oft-quoted <u>Proverbs 31</u>, the "wife of noble character" is honored by her husband and children for her virtues.

Motherhood wasn't a requirement for godly women in Bible times—and just as today, not every woman who wanted children was granted her wish. But the mothers and matriarchs of the Bible exhibit qualities that all of us, male or female, parent or not, should strive to emulate. Here are a few of the famous mothers of the Bible, with links to their stories:

### 1. Mary, the Mother of Jesus

Perhaps no more famous mother exists than Mary, who at a young age learned from an angel that she would give birth to the long-awaited Messiah. Her <u>song of praise</u> in response, and the well-known events of Christ's birth, are what usually spring to mind when we think of Mary. But her role as mother brought her grief as well as joy; we can only imagine what it must have been like for her to witness Jesus' crucifixion. Read her story in John 19.

### 2. Elizabeth

Mary's was not the only miraculous birth recorded in the New Testament. Elizabeth was a godly woman who was "righteous in the sight of God, observing all the Lord's commands and decrees blamelessly"-and yet she and her husband were unable to conceive a child. God answered her prayers late in her life and she gave birth to John the Baptist, but is perhaps best known for her prophetic encouragement of the young (and perhaps frightened) Mary: "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the child you will bear! But why am I so favored, that the mother of my Lord should come to me? As soon as the sound of *vour greeting reached my ears, the baby in my* womb leaped for joy. Blessed is she who has believed that the Lord would fulfill his promises to her!" Read her story in Luke 1.

### 3. Hannah

Hannah is one of the most inspiring mothers in the Bible, although her story is less well-known. Despite years of patience and prayer, she remained unable to have a child. One day "in her deep anguish Hannah prayed to the LORD, weeping bitterly"—and God answered her prayer at last. But Hannah's character truly shone when, in gratitude to God, she dedicated her newborn son to His service. Her son would one day become one of Israel's greatest prophets. Read her story in 1 Samuel 1.

# 4. Sarah, the Wife of Abraham

Sarah is one of the great matriarchs of the Bible yet she didn't become a mother until very late in life. In fact, her reaction to God's promise that she would have a son was to laugh, as memorably recorded in Genesis 18. Nevertheless she did give birth to a son, and her lineage would include Jesus Christ himself. Read her story in Genesis 18.

There are many more famous mothers described in the Bible; many of them righteous, some not so much, but all used by God to bring about His design. This weekend, as we give thanks for the mothers in our lives, consider how you can embody the traits that define a godly mother patience, kindheartedness, faithfulness—and consider how you can encourage the mothers in your community, young and old, as they work to meet that same standard.

Why is it important for us to attend church services regularly, usually weekly? Allow me to share nine reasons - by Thomas Rainer

1. **The local church was God's plan in the New Testament.** From the founding of the first local church in Jerusalem to the growth of new congregations throughout the Roman Empire, the New Testament is clear. God wanted His people gathering regularly and faithfully. And lest we forget, all of these congregations had problems. All of these churches had problem people. Hypocrisy was real and pervasive, but it was not a valid excuse to give up the local church.

2. The Bible speaks clearly about the priority of local congregations. If you read the New Testament from Acts to Revelation, you will see that a gathered church was not just one important factor for the Christian, it was one of the highest priorities. After the ascension of Jesus, the local church was truly "the body of Christ."

3. We are commanded and designed to enjoy worshipping the one true God as a gathered community. What if church members really did one thing in worship services? What if they asked God to let them see Him and know Him fully as the church gathered together? What if that was the priority over evaluating the style of music? What if that was more important than the preacher preaching five minutes more than you deemed appropriate?

4. A unified church can stand strong in a culture turning away from God. We can't be a unified church with sporadic attendance. We can't stand together if we aren't persistently gathered together. Do you remember how the early church in Jerusalem reached a culture opposed to God? The outside world saw the unity and joy of the church and wanted to know more about this Jesus they worshipped. Remember, they were "praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. Every day the Lord added to their number those were being saved" (Acts 2:47). A faithfully attended church is a unified church. A unified church is an evangelistic church.

5. The world looks at our priorities and evaluates what we deem as important. Expanding on the previous point, we can't expect the community we serve to get excited about our church if the members of the community see it to be a low priority among the members. The twicea-month attendees make the church an afterthought. The once-a-month attendee hardly thinks about the church at all.

6. When we gather together worshipping w Accountability takes place in the local church ith others, we are holding each other up and accountable. When we belong to a small group in the church, our absence is conspicuous. We need people holding us accountable in love. We need others looking after us. Accountability is indeed a good thing.

# 7. Families that attend church faithfully and regularly are happier and healthier families.

The research from the secular world is overwhelming. Study after study shows that families who are in church almost every week are among those with the best-adjusted children. Marriages are healthier. Small children grow to become mature and joyous adults. Though these studies are affirming, we can see throughout the New Testament how God has a clear and compelling plan for His children and their families to gather together regularly and faithfully.

Discipleship takes place in the local 8. church. There seems to be this big mystery about discipleship. How do we do discipleship? Exactly what is discipleship? How does that work in the local church? Remember, discipleship is simply becoming more like Christ. We become more like Christ as we gather and worship together. We become more like Christ when we belong to a small group and do community together. We become more like Christ as we listen to the preached Word every week. We become more like Christ as we do ministry and evangelism through our local church. For sure, discipleship can take place outside the local church. But the New Testament clearly demonstrates the local congregation is God's "Plan A" for growing as a disciple.

God gives us great joy when we serve oth-9. ers through the local church. For sure, there are some grumpy and miserable church members. They seem to have a common trait. There are things in the church that aren't going *their* way. They are not getting *their* worship style. They are not getting themselves fed. They don't like the way the pastor does things because it's not *their* way. They focus on three people: me, myself, and I. But we can experience incredible joy as we serve others, as we put others before ourselves, as we don't focus on our own preferences and desires. We experience incredible jov as we serve other church members and those who reside in our community.

All of these nine reasons, of course, presume we are faithful attenders. We are neither obedient nor are we able to experience the full joy of our church if we attend once or twice a month or even less.

Faithful weekly church attendance is important. It brings us joy. It helps us to grow spiritually. It is one of the primary characteristics of a healthy family.

Above all, it is an act of obedience to God.

And that's what really matters.
