MODERATOR'S NOTES

We have formed a new Pastoral Search Committee (PSC) and are proceeding with retaining a new settled pastor for KCC. Dean Wakuzawa, Alan Yoneshige, Dennis Fong and Vernon Pang are the current Council members who are already on the PSC. Reggie Yamada, Susan Morita, Katelyn Wakuzawa and Gail Yoneshige have recently indicated a willingness to serve on the new PSC. The committee is moving forward to contact perspective candidates and begin the interview process.

The PSC does not plan to create a new KCC church profile as most of that work has been completed two years ago by the prior PSC just before Pastor Dale Vallejo-Sanderson was hired. The KCC church profile will require some updating but we don't think that the PSC will have to start over again from scratch. Now that the PSC is formed, it can start to make decisions regarding the pursuit and retention of our new pastor.

Your moderator recently attended the annual meeting of the Hawaii Conference of the UCC (HCUCC) which was conducted June 12-18, 2022, via Zoom.

The business issues voted upon were whether the Hawaii Conference of the UCC would support the Tri-Isle Association's proposal to affirm the use of Licensed and Commissioned Ministers as authorized ministers in the UCC and recommend to the General Synod that the UCC's Manual on Ministry be so amended. These are pastors who are not fully ordained and have not completed four years of undergraduate studies and three years of seminary training. The provision passed.

The other provision up for a vote was whether to pass a resolution on Becoming a Church Against Gun Violence which appeared to be a general call to action by the HCUCC against gun violence. It passed also.








DEACONS CORNER

WORSHIP NEWS

Notwithstanding the significantly increased Covid cases in Hawaii in recent weeks, we have decided to continue to conduct in-person and online worship services. This will continue to be the case for the foreseeable future. We are currently having about 15 to 20 people come to the in-person service in the sanctuary and 25-30 participate online via Zoom. Many people do not feel comfortable in-person yet and others are not comfortable or capable of participating online. We are continuing to strongly recommend masks during the service and whenever we are indoors at the KCC facility until the Covid numbers improve.

We have been having live guest speakers each week. They appear enthusiastic to share a message with us and willing to fill in various parts of the service. We have been blessed with a wide variety of preachers and speakers and their messages have been inspirational. It is a lot of work to ask new people who we do not know well to come and serve in this capacity each week. Kammy has been doing that work for us along with preparing the songs, the scripture readings, the sermon notes, and other material for the PowerPoint slides.

Our Worship Team is working hard and doing a good job. Despite improvements in our volunteer Worship Team's ability to do this work, we continue to have setbacks due primarily to old equipment failures. Much of our AV and lighting system was installed before the turn of the century. In addition, when one or two people on the Worship Team fall ill, we encourage them to stay home. Often, we do not have readily available-backup personnel for those who are ill.

We are planning to implement a significant overhaul to the audio-visual (AV) system that will probably involve replacing our projector with TV monitors so that the people in the sanctuary will be clearly seeing the same thing that is being broadcast to the online people. We might be able to mount cameras in such a way that they will be operated remotely. We will also try to marry our two sound systems (online and in-person) together. The spotlights over the alter/pulpit area that were installed in the nineties will also receive an upgrade. We have been in contact with an AV consultant who is expected to help us with this transition and upgrade.

We continue to need people to be trained by Aaron Tanaka and Andrew Vallejo-Sanderson, to assist with the PowerPoint and Zoom broadcasting of the services. If you have these skills, or would like to learn these skills, please let us know.

Thanks for everybody's patience and for all the hard work by our Worship Team servants.

Stories Behind the Numbers

Update from IHS

This year's Point in Time Count numbers show that overall homelessness has declined. Since the last count in 2020, the number of homeless individuals on Oahu has dropped by 11%.

What we see on the streets tells a different story. That is because while overall homelessness has declined, the number of unsheltered homeless individuals (those living on the streets) has increased while those in shelters have decreased.

What this tells us is that for people who are willing and able to accept it, help is available and effective. Homelessness among families with keiki is down by 60% since 2015. Veterans homelessness is also trending downward. Federal and local programs paired with non-profits like IHS have helped families remain in their homes despite the economic impact of the pandemic; and have helped quickly rehouse those who have fallen into homelessness.

To help those who have been unwilling to accept help, we are increasing our efforts to build bridges and convince people to make a change. The homeless triage and transfer program provides intensive outreach to these individuals and will soon have a home in a new building in Iwilei that will provide medically assisted detox services along with mental health services and case management. I can't wait to tell you more as the site nears completion.

Until then, thank you as always for your unwavering support and the impact you've had on reducing homelessness among key populations.
