




When I accepted the pastoral role at your church, I didn’t perceive a congregation heading irreversibly into financial trouble. Many churches have faced such predicaments due to prolonged stagnation and reluctance to adapt. Initially, I categorized KCC in this group, almost overlooking its potential. Yet, upon engaging with KCC members, I discovered an extraordinary community that’s far from stagnation. I halted interviews elsewhere to focus entirely on this remarkable congregation, abundant in love and a fervent desire to uphold Christ’s light.

While you might see diminishing finances and an aging congregation, I see an exceptional opportunity to revitalize a church. I was genuinely excited to meet you all because I perceived not just substantial resources, but also a devoted congregation eager to navigate toward stability. We possess all the essential elements—a sufficient savings account, a dedicated pastor, a commendable property, and a united, motivated congregation—to fulfill Jesus’ Great Commission and positively impact our community.

Though the opportunity is vast, our window for action is limited. The savings won’t last indefinitely, the building will require ongoing maintenance, and hope may diminish over time. Jesus calls us to confront our commitment courageously. Bravery is advancing despite fear. Let us persist in doing good without weariness, for our efforts will yield results in due time if we remain steadfast.

In 2024, try to devote time to improving the health of our church.

WORSHIP NEWS

Every Sunday we sing "You Are the Vine" to close our worship service. When we skipped "You Are the Vine" at our morning Christmas Eve service and sang "Joy to the World" instead, my granddaughters asked me why we didn't sing it. On the way home from church that day we sang "You Are the Vine" in the car. I also assured them that the next time they came to church we will be singing "You Are the Vine" again.

I love that song for many reasons. It is special to us at KCC because it is so familiar and is the last song we sing each week as we close our worship and leave each other and start our new week. It binds us together as a family and reminds us of how important it is to be in a close relationship with our Lord. It is a comfortable song which makes us feel connected with each other and provides us assurances that God has us in his care.

The Bible verse that is the source of the words for that song is John 15: 5 which reads: "I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing."

When Jesus talks about bearing much fruit, I think he is talking about the fruit of the Spirit. The fruit of the Spirit are: Love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness, faithfulness, and self-control. You might think that these are things that we can do or at least strive to do, on our own. The Bible verse at John 15: 5, however, reminds us that we can't. It says: "apart from me you can do nothing."

And the command that he gives us at John 5 verse 12 is to love each other as He has loved us. He reminds us at verses 16 & 17 that: "You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you so that you might go bear fruit – fruit that will last – and so that whatever you ask in my name the Father will give you. This is my command: Love each other." He has chosen us and empowered us






